

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FROM THE HEADMISTRESS'S DESK



Dear Girls, Old Girls, Staff, Parents and Friends of the School

Larlier this year, I wrote: a year is divided into four seasons, each bringing an end to the previous season and a sense that the world is shifting into something different for a time, before that season also ends and we shift into the next and the opportunities that it brings.

As the year draws to a close, and as we ready ourselves to shift into the next season, it is important to pause and reflect on the year that has passed. It is on reflection that we see events in context and realise that all things, no matter how challenging at the time, work towards good. The world has demanded much courage from its people this year – from the war in Ukraine, the floods in Kwazulu Natal, to rising costs and load-shedding – it has not been easy for so many. Within our School, our Collegiate family, there have also been challenging times this year, times when it seemed our values of respect, compassion and integrity, had slipped from sight, and times when we faced varied interpretations and recollections, fueled by misinformation on social media. My fervent wish is that 2023 will be a year of respectful face-toface discussion without preconceived judgements, resulting in malicious hurt.

The privilege of being an educator is to nurture growth, change and development of those in our charge. It is to model courage and respect to our learners; it is to show compassion and to forgive. The reward then comes, sometimes soon, sometimes only years later, when those values and actions become a way of life for learners who were once in the throes of rebellious adolescence.

A further privilege of being an educator is to be part of change, to direct change and to assist change. This year has been a year of changes: we have emerged from COVID-19; we have surveyed all on the school uniform to see if changes are required; we have brought new life to the foyer and former blue area – now resplendent with lighter flooring and learners' art work up the staircase; we have included positive education as a way of enhancing learners' well-being; we have sought to improve our communication systems; and we have continued with the heart-work necessary for developing understanding and transformative change.



In 1964, Bob Dylan wrote the song "The Times They Are A-Changin":

Come gather 'round people Wherever you roam And admit that the waters Around you have grown And accept it that soon You'll be drenched to the bone If your time to you is worth savin' Then you better start swimmin' Or you'll sink like a stone For the times they are a-changin'.

At Collegiate, the times are a-changin', keeping the firm foundation of our values and traditions, while seeking to be a diverse space where understanding flourishes and inclusivity unites us. At the time of Mandela Day this year, I shared in assembly the late Former President Nelson Rolihlahala Mandela's belief that the best way to contribute to nation-building and reconciliation is to learn each other's languages. I said to the learners that identity comes from our names and our language, for it is through language that we express who we are and connect with others. To be able to understand the language of another leads one into the world of that person and enables one to connect on a different level. I then made a commitment to learn isiXhosa (albeit at an extremely slow pace) as part of my journey to greater connection with and understanding of all Collegiate learners. I encourage others to find the courage to do the same.

My thoughts return to our five values, embodied in the five remarkable women whose images and words grace the wall in the old blue area. In those five values, lies what we need to

live lives of significance and success. In those values, too, lies that which we need to make Collegiate united in its diversity, inclusive of all and a place where all feel comfortable in their skins and can be courageous in the community: doing the hard work, being responsible, showing respect and compassion to others and always acting from a place of integrity.

As I conclude my reflection, my eyes glance over the articles and photographs in this magazine. I see fun, laughter, sister-hood, unity, camaraderie and fellowship, assigning the challenges of the year and the tail-end of the global pandemic to a position of insignificance. I feel an immense sense of pride. I believe we should all be filled with gratitude when we reflect on what Collegiate offers and stands for.

May you enjoy reading the 2022 School Magazine, a reflection of the 148th year of Collegiate Girls' High School. Thank you to the Editor, Mrs Hayley Carter, her Assistant Editor, Mrs Lynn van Dyk, and the Magazine Team for their labour of love in documenting this year for posterity.

Finally, my deep gratitude goes to every staff member for their hard work and dedication to their profession and to the wellbeing of the girls of the College.

I wish you all a pleasant holiday and a blessed festive season. May God bless you and keep you safe until we meet again. Mag God jou in die palm van sy hand hou. Uxolo malube nani.






The Matrics were each given a vinyl record as a keepsake


















Our Collegiate Cross Country team had a very good season and came away victorious in most events.





LIFE SCIENCES AND PHYSICAL SCIENCES

The Collegiate Life and Physical Science Departments consist of Mr Marriott (Head of Life Sciences), Dr Radue (Head of Physical Sciences), Mrs Arthur, Ms Mkhonza and Mrs Grobbelaar. We continue to strive to make science relevant, fun and exciting for the girls and our staff always give of their best. There has been a welcome return to practical work since COVID regulations prevented us from doing practicals in Life Science, and the learners have embraced the experience of hands-on work.

Peer tutoring in Physical and Natural Science is offered once a week on Tuesdays. There are some Grade Eight and Nine girls who have made use of this opportunity, but very few Grade Ten, Eleven and Twelve girls have done so. The Science teachers would like to encourage the girls to ask for help and to attend tutoring, either with us or with the 'Studying Sisterhood' offered at Collegiate.

In celebration of the International Year of Basic Science for Sustainable Development 2022, Women in Physics in South Africa, (a chapter of the South African Institute of Physics SAIP), arranged a number of activities for learners this year. Approximately twenty girls participated in the CMS Virtual tour and two teams took part in the SAIP Video competition. The CMS experiment is one of two particle detectors built at the Large Hadron Collider (LHC) at CERN in Switzerland and France. It is the largest and most powerful particle accelerator in the world, consisting of a huge underground circular tunnel 27 km in circumference. The goal of the SAIP video competition was to make a short four-minute video explaining how to use physics to solve one of the sustainable development goals. The Grade Twelve team won the competition in the Grade Ten to Twelve section and received a cash prize. The Grade Ten team did very well and received Rubik's Cubes as prizes.

The Grade Eleven Life Sciences classes spent a morning at the Van Stadens Wildflower Reserve, a sanctuary representative of the Fynbos biome within the Cape Floral Kingdom which, in its entirety, is a World Heritage Site.

Fantastic weather, great scenery, fresh air, and lots of laughs set the tone for a successful excursion. Most of the girls hiked over 10 km along the Reserve's various trails.

During the day, the girls observed some natural phenomena that they had never witnessed before: identifying plants

such as the Alice Sundew (*Drosera aliciae*), a carnivorous plant that snags insects with sticky tentacles; watching a crowd of African Social Spiders (*Stegodyphus dumicola*) scurry out of their communal nest that consists of the bodies of their victims, like something from a Harry Potter movie; and observing the positive and negative impact of humans on the environment.





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GRADE ELEVEN GEOGRAPHY TOUR

On the last day of Term Three, twenty-two very excited Geography students embarked on a journey of discovery and learning to Nieu-Bethesda and Graaff-Reinet.

On entering Nieu-Bethesda, we had a very interesting discussion about how the surrounding mountains were formed through melting glaciers. We learned about the settlement of Nieu-Bethesda: its origin, its situation today, as well as the canals that run through the small town, providing water from a nearby spring. After the discussion we made our way to the Owl House where we learnt about Helen Martins and explored the house and its garden.

We had a fossil tour at Kitching Fossils, where we were shown the work done by palaeontologists. We learnt how fossils form over millions of years, as well as the very specific conditions that are required for fossil formation. We were shown the painstakingly long process that is used to expose the fossils. We went down to the dry river bed with a tour guide to look at fossils that were still in the rock.

We made our way through Graaff-Reinet and stopped at the Camdeboo National Park to visit the Valley of Desolation. After a ten-minute walk to the top, we were met with the most beautiful sight of the sheer cliffs and unusually

balanced dolerite rocks. Many girls were awestruck by the magnificent view. We also stopped at the stereoscope to look at other landforms as well as have to get a bird's-eye view of the town of Graaff-Reinet. After spending some time at the Valley of Desolation, we ate a proper Karoo-style dinner. It was a great way to end off a jam-packed day.

The following day we embarked on a three-kilometre hike which took two hours. We encountered ostriches and a friendly scorpion. While on the hike, Mrs Kelly and Mrs Shaw taught us about the weathering of the rocks in the area due to changes in temperature; the formation of hills and valleys due to the flowing of the rivers; and the different vegetation in the region based on a combination of climate and number of animals living in the area.

After the hike we went to the Reinet House Museum where we got an idea of what life was like in the 1800s.

We had a great time on tour learning about fossils, settlements, Geology and the beautiful sights of Graaff-Reinet. Thank you to Mrs Shaw and Mrs Kelly for their hard work, excellent planning and enthusiasm on tour.

On 24 March, the Grade Twelves of 2022 embarked on the first Geography excursion in two years. Twenty-six very excited learners climbed onto the buses and made their way to the Kariga (Uitenhage), Addo and Nanaga areas.

On day one, we made our way to the Swartkops River that runs from the mountain range behind Kariga all the way to the coast at Bluewater Bay. The aim of the study was to discover the effects of urban settlements on a river system. Our Geography girls came across numerous factories, stinky sewage works as well as informal settlements and devastating quarrying — all of which are having a hugely negative impact on the health of the Swartkops River system. "Dave, our guide, taught us invaluable knowledge about how delicate and vital this river is to sustain the ecosystem," reported Tanith Moreton. This is but one example of the deterioration of the rivers in South Africa.

From there, we moved on to have lunch at Nanaga and then made our way to Addo where we stopped briefly at our accommodation, "Leaders In Life," and then went on to visit the Wicklow Citrus Farms and Packhouse. We received a wonderful welcome from the Wicklow farmers. We were greeted by the farm manager, Dom McQueen, as well as a line-up of all the managers of the different divisions on the farm. We were educated about the watering systems, pest control, fertilisers, picking, security and general logistics of running a citrus farm. We went on to the packhouse where

we were taken through the processes of sorting, cleaning, boxing and shipping citrus to international customers. We spent a fascinating three hours there and it was an absolute treat to see these facilities being run by strong and confident women: both the farm manager and the packhouse manager are women.

On day two, we were up early and were excited to get the day started. The day began with ziplining, which drew much excitement from the eager Grade Twelves. After everyone had their turn to fly through the sky, we guickly packed the buses and were on our way to the Nanaga area to Springmount Dairy Farm. After a very wet and extremely slippery drive, we finally arrived at the farm. We were warmly welcomed with tea, coffee and delicious chocolate cake. Alasdair Broadbent, the farm owner, greeted us and gave us some history about the farm. He then went through the ins and outs of running a dairy farm. Once everyone had consumed their cake and coffee, we embarked on a tractor and trailer ride around the farm to see the cattle being led to be milked, as well as the bail storage, the calves and finally, the milking area. The Grade Twelves were taught about all the different processes that go into getting the milk from the cows to the containers on the supermarket shelves. They learnt all about the milking process as well as artificial insemination of the cows.

These two days were very busy and jam-packed with activity and an overload of information. Tanith said, "It was overall

a very educational yet fun tour where the girls were able to bond."

Zeytka Verster said, "The activities the girls enjoyed the most were the canoe paddling and swimming in the Sundays River. Highlights were the ziplining and the tractor ride on the Broadbents' dairy and beef farm. We are grateful to Mrs Shaw and Mrs Kelly who organized this excursion and accompanied us. The Grade Twelves Geography girls of 2022 will think back fondly on this great practical learning experience."

New experiences were had and the girls had their eyes opened to the human effects on our rivers and the hardships of farming. We hope that they take this experience into their exams but also out with them into the wide world.

It is my pleasure to welcome you to the annual Awards Ceremony of Collegiate Girls' High School. A special welcome to our esteemed guest speaker Dr Muki Moeng, the Executive Dean of the Faculty of Education at Nelson Mandela University. We look forward to your address later in the programme and are sure that it is going to be most inspirational. On stage, too, we welcome Mrs van Rooyen, the Principal of Collegiate Junior School for Girls; the Deputy Principals, Mrs Gerber and Mrs Nel, and the members of our management team, Mrs Carter, Mrs Jooste, Mrs Lotz, Mr Batista and Mr Beynon. In the audience we welcome Mrs Nienaber, Chairman of our School Governing Body, as well as all other SGB members present here tonight. Welcome to Mr and Dr Whale, Deputy Principal of Collegiate Junior School for Girls. From Grey High School, we welcome the Rector, Mr Erasmus, and Mr Marx, former Deputy Principal at this school and now at Grey High School - welcome to you and your wife. It is good to have you back with us this evening. A special welcome to past Deputy Principal and Acting Principal, Mrs Biggs, and to past staff members, Mrs Bransby and Mrs Joseph who still give so much time to Collegiate. With us from Clarendon Park Primary School, is Deputy Principal Mrs Rhodes – welcome. Special guests tonight are Ms Moloi and Mr Seemola from the Tutuwa Foundation - welcome and thank you for your foundation's support of our scholars. A very special welcome goes to the Collegiate staff, the 2022 and 2023 Prefects, all the award winners and their parents, the Grade Eleven and Twelve learners, and the Matric parents who have joined us tonight. We are delighted to have you with us this evening.

There is so much in which to take delight, at this beautiful school – a grand old lady of 148 years. To be part of an institution of such an age, is to be part of something that is rooted, and those roots go deep, anchoring the institution when the storms come.

What are those roots that provide the stability and hold us steadfast? In an educational institution, academic achievement is always a goal, and excellence, a value. In January, we stood tall when 131 learners out of 134 achieved bachelor passes in the 2021 National Senior Certificate Examination. Of the class of 2021 31 achieved 'A' aggregates, eleven learners had a full house of distinctions, and we had a 100% pass rate once more. In addition, Jamie Miller was placed in top position in the Nelson Mandela Bay District, and Frances Brummer was placed joint second in the Eastern Cape Province. This was achieved after almost two years of Covid – which shows how deep the good work ethic runs.

This work ethic shone through when the 'Studying Sisterhood' was initiated this year by the Academic Portfolio Prefect, Robyn Hechter. The 'Studying Sisterhood' involves



older learners tutoring younger ones, but doing so much more by mentoring and giving guidance on time management, coping with stress and organisational skills. The Grade Eleven academic leadership group also conceptualised and organised an Academic Subject Fair for the Grade Nines ahead of their making their choices of subjects for the FET phase.

Academic education is always more than covering the syllabus within the four walls of the classroom and we are pleased to have resumed field trips: the Geography learners have toured twice to experience and see how the subject has relevance in the world. The Grade Eleven Life Sciences learners go on a field trip next week, and exciting plans are afoot for a tour to the Cradle of Humankind at Maropeng and experiencing various other areas along the route in 2023. This will be a cross-curriculum educational experience covering aspects of the Life Sciences, Geography and History curricula.

We have also introduced some project-based learning in the junior grades and have plans for further academic innovation in 2023. Underpinning and facilitating this, is the extensive investment over a number of years in digital technology which has not only streamlined our systems but is also equipping our learners for the use of digital technology required for their tertiary studies. Thank you to parents who pay fees diligently, often at great sacrifice, and to the School Governing Body for their good stewardship of the finances of the School which has enabled the realisation of our Digital Technology Strategy.

Part of being a respected academic institution is to equip learners to be responsible citizens, to understand the society in which we live, and to question the society from a values-perspective. The Simamele Forum, started in 2021, is a forum through which pertinent issues in society can be



addressed, discussed and challenged. The Further Studies English Class had the privilege of a visit, workshop, talk by and engagement with Mike van Graan, who is the playwright of 'Green Man Flashing' one of the texts that they study. The topic of Mr van Graan's talk was the Role of the Artist in South Africa and Globally, and he challenged all to look deeper at issues in our country post – 1994. The Debating Society is another vehicle through which critical thought is applied to societal issues and our Debating Team is to be congratulated on winning the Nelson Mandela Bay League.

To be able to read critically, understand current issues, write effectively and apply analytical skills are so important, and the '150 Books for 150 years' initiative feeds into that. Reading extensively equips one not only to cope with academic work, but also to broaden one's world. This vision of the Subject Head of English, Ms Kromhout, for every member of the Collegiate Community to have read 150 books by Collegiate's 150 Jubilee year in 2024, is slowly gaining traction, and we will not relent in our fervent encouragement of all to read.

A vital root that grounds Collegiate is 'Facta non Verba': service and community outreach. The '150 Books for 150 years' initiative, extends further than Collegiate with Interact and lovers of reading partnering with St Augustine's Primary School to refurbish their library and inspire reading in the young learners.

Each House has also engaged with various projects in the greater Gqeberha society: Queen Alexandra, with the EP Children's Home; Queen Victoria, with the Yokhusela Haven; Queen Elizabeth, with SANCCOB Wildlife Rescue Service; Queen Mary, with Bet Sheekoom – House of Restoration for Women in Crisis; and St Michael and St George, with WESSA, the Wildlife Environmental Society South Africa.

Clubs and Societies and Sports were also charged with applying our motto to make a difference in the community, and many did. SCA has been working with the Maranatha Youth Centre; MSA has raised R7 000 to donate to 'Gift of the Givers' in support of the drilling of boreholes in our town; the sports drive for Sport Revolution saw girls quietly coaching in the community. These were just some of the projects our girls undertook. In addition, various grades rolled up their sleeves to make love sandwiches; squares were knitted for the 67 Blankets for Mandela Day project and the Charity Bazaar raised over R66 000 for Christmas Cheer. Carols practices are underway for the Carols Performance which will be held this year over two nights in our School quad. Girls are also making various items for sale to add to the money raised by the Carols Services to be donated to Community Chest.

Sport at Collegiate is another root that anchors our School and there have been so many achievements by both teams and individuals, that in trying to mention all would no doubt overlook some. I will highlight but a few: the recent Sun City Tennis tournament at which games were played in temperatures soaring above 400. What grit and resilience the girls showed as they played with determination. The U14A, U16A and First Hockey teams were all invited to the Top 10 festivals, and the First Team won the Spar Hockey Challenge. We held the inaugural U19 Netball Festival in July. Our U15 Water Polo Tournament was a success, and Iman Akomalafe played Water Polo for South Africa in Budapest. Cross Country was included in a derby day for the first time. Tiara Finnis excelled







in various international swimming championships and Kayla Schmelzer swam in the Commonwealth Swimming Trials. Numerous learners excelled in various 'outside of school' sports, which included Ocean Series Swimming, Downhill Cycling, Golf, Life-saving, Indoor Hockey, Show-jumping and Motor-cross. Many of our sports women, both of school sports and 'outside of school' sports were part of provincial teams and participated in inter-provincial tournaments and some trialled for SA squads.

With a broader reach in the school, Cross-Fit was included in Physical Education classes and a large contingent of teams travelled to the City of Roses in the Free State for the annual Oranje – Collegiate Derby.

Music has been a part of the grand old lady's life since opening the doors in 1874 and this year our musicians were able to showcase their talents in Monday morning assemblies, and in numerous concerts and eisteddfods. Concerts included 'Musical Moments', 'Broadway Memories', the Concert Band's online performance, 'Jazz by Candlelight', the Choir's participation in Westering High School's Voce Volante Festival and in the 'Sing a Song' Choir Festival with Andre Schwartz. Next week, our inaugural Piano Symposium will take place and we look forward to the success of that.

Evidence of the rich talent of our musicians are 11 silver, 11 gold and 8 double-gold awards in the Pearson Praeludium; four girls performing in the finals of the SASMT Competition; and our talented Grade Twelve clarinetist, Robin Wentzel, whom you will hear perform tonight, was placed second overall at the 14th National Makhanda Music Competition and awarded Best Woodwind Performer.

Drama and Dance are also woven into the root system of Collegiate. The House Plays were enjoyed once again. Dance is now established as an elective in Creative Arts in Grades Eight and Nine, and several learners take Dance Studies as an eighth subject in Grades Ten to Twelve. Our dancers excelled

in various Dance Festivals, Collegiate-Grey placed second overall in the 'Dare to Dance' Ballroom Dancing Competition, and we are proud of our learners who will be participating in the World Irish Dancing Championships.

Rooted deep in the fibre of the School, going back to the

1800s, is the Hostel. The special bond that is formed amongst the boarders, the sense of family, and the spirit that the boarders bring into the school is something that a day-school-only simply cannot replicate. The Waterfield House of today is a luxurious hotel compared to the guarters the boarders had over 100 years ago in Central – they slept on open balconies with canvas tarpaulin sides for shelter against the wind and rain. No doubt that built grit and resilience in those boarders! A very successful Waterfield House Market was held on the Founders Weekend and the funds raised have enabled a revamp of the gardens, the building of a braai pit and the purchase of outdoor seating and tables. The girls are looking forward to their first braai and spending many an hour relaxing in the garden. Thank you to the committed hostel parents who contributed to the Hostel Fundraiser, in time or product, and especially to Old Girl, Mrs Nicola Broadbent, mother of our Deputy Head Girl, who has been the driver behind the project to improve the physical environment of the Hostel. It is wonderful to have the involvement of parents and old girls in the school. It is from the watering of the







roots through the fun, the camaraderie, the sisterhood, that old girls return, even at the age of 93! Through these experiences, Collegiate takes root in the fibre of our learners and will keep them returning.

Looking forward to future years in the light of the societal and economic situation in our country and the challenges facing the Public Service, it is evident that the sustainability of the School in all areas lies in our hands. Earlier this year, the School Governing Body appointed a Development and Fundraising Officer, with the dual vision of a Foundation Office feeding into the Collegia Trust and a reconnection with as many of our alumnae as possible ahead of the grand old lady's 150th Jubilee year. The planning of the 150th year is underway: the soil is being fertilised so those roots can be strengthened through development and involvement. Involvement and giving back take many forms such as the indigenous Cheesewood Tree that was kindly donated by the class of 2002 so that the friendships formed under the shade in years to come will stand strong and true.

As I approach the conclusion of my address, I return to my earlier statement that the roots of this great institution anchor when storms come. There have been storms this year that have shaken our community and left scars. We live in a complex society in a world of shifting perspectives, diverse communities, and instant and far-reaching social communication media. The complexities in our country are rooted in so many things, but it is not for now to analyse these.

Schools are always microcosms of the greater society and thus we will experience the challenges experienced beyond these walls. As an educational institution, a values-driven educational institution, we must always reflect on how best to make the values of good work ethic, respect, responsibility, compassion and integrity take root in our learners to equip them to make the world around them a kinder, more accepting, more compassionate world, where every action that they take is respectful, inclusive and comes from a place of integrity.

To conclude, tonight we celebrate achievement, spirit and good character through the awards that will be made. My congratulations to those who have excelled and who will be honoured tonight.

I wish to thank the staff of Collegiate for their time and commitment to the girls of this school. Our academic, sport, administrative, finance, support, hostel and security staff have the girls of this school as their number one priority. Without the dedication and hard work of these people, Collegiate would not be the great school which it is.

I also wish to pay tribute to our Governors who work tirelessly in the interest of this school. They give the School so much of their time and expertise, and for that we are most grateful. Ladies and gentlemen, special guests – thank you for being here tonight and I hope that you enjoy the proceedings.



SQUEST SPEAKER'S ADDRESS: SPEECH NIGHT AND PRIZE-GIVING 2022





Good evening to the Principal, the School Management Team, teachers, the School Governing Body, parents and learners.

It is my pleasure to be here talking to young people who have the world waiting for them to make a contribution. I am intentionally positioning you as someone who must give and not expect to be given to and not to feel entitled that someone owes you your future. Yes, your parents are responsible for your physical and emotional development; the government is responsible for providing education, functional schools, water, basic housing, usable roads, and so forth. I believe that once you have the outlook of giving, that is when you find your passion. Life without passion is miserable for you and the people around you. Your passion and your purpose go hand in hand. Once you have accepted your purpose and found your passion you are able to live a fulfilling life. A fulfilling life is not only about possessions, but about inner satisfaction that only you can experience. Sometimes it takes a long time to realise that you are where you are supposed to be and are doing what no one else can do the way you do it.

You, thus, have a responsibility to lead your life responsibly and use the opportunity you have wisely. Many children in South Africa do not have what you have. They dearly wish to have what you have been provided with. As a young high school learner, you have so many possibilities. Possibilities remain just that if you do not work hard and put time into realizing your dreams. I am very interested in and impressed by your school's vision of 'Pursuing Excellence through

Holistic Education'. This vision speaks to the balanced curricula and co-curricular activities that prepare the learner holistically. It speaks to the kind of citizen that this school prepares. A citizen who pursues excellence in all areas of life: the intellect, the physical, the social and the spiritual, meaning a healthy body, a healthy mind, a healthy attitude and a healthy soul. I believe that this is done while adhering to your school value of a good work ethic, responsibility, respect, compassion and integrity.

This moment is the culmination of all the hard work that you invested in your future over the years. You have prepared, tilled the soil and nurtured it with water and sometimes fertilizers to help enrich it for a better harvest. We all did the seed germination experiment in primary school. We gave it the right amount of warmth, sunlight and water and watched it grow. We nurtured it and made sure that it did not die. Such is the tenacity that is needed to reach your dreams.

I have always wanted to become a teacher. There were possibilities, and I had to use every opportunity to make my dream a reality. There were people in my path who helped me to realise my dream. One can never walk alone — there always are people who help you to cross over valleys, climb mountains, run up and down slopes, swim across stormy rivers and, at times, fly over obstacles. Such people are called parents, grandparents, friends and most definitely teachers. I had to put in time and effort to make my dream come true.

That does not mean that there were no obstacles. I had to repeat Standard Six three times because of political

unrest and being jailed for two months as a fifteen-yearold. Teenage pregnancy was another obstacle, as well as a learning curve, for me. Fortunately, my parents and teachers helped me through that. I am standing in front of you as a cancer survivor. I was diagnosed with breast cancer in March 2020. I went through surgery, chemotherapy and radiation. I lost my hair, I gained weight and had many body aches and pains.

Why am I telling you all of this? Because life happens, and it is how you bounce back that matters. You need to be able to pick yourself up and believe that tomorrow is another opportunity to do things right and do them better in order to improve.

Always try to bring your authentic self to whatever task you are confronted with.

I went to university to become a teacher. I got what I dreamed about and more. I even got a scholarship to study overseas. I never thought I'd become a lecturer, let alone become a Dean. I thought I would become a school principal, which I believe is a very important job in any country. I know I would have been a very good school principal. I am now responsible for preparing and delivering teachers who are well rounded with regard to their content knowledge, understanding the context of learners and agents of change, hope and social justice. That is what drives me every day. I am passionate about it because I know that it will make a difference and that I am contributing something towards society.

Never underestimate your role as an individual because your journey is someone else's lesson. There are certain experiences that one goes through, some more pleasant than others. Sometimes it appears that others have it easy, but do not forget that we all have our challenges and those are personal and should never be compared. If you do that, you will frustrate yourself as life is complex and has no 'one size fits all' formula. That is why learning is such an important and beautiful aspect of life. It helps us to gain perspective so that we can make better judgements. You, therefore, learn from your own experience and from those of others. There is no wisdom in repeating someone else's mistake. Experiences give you better perspective to know what to ignore and what to pursue. Always try to bring your authentic self to whatever task you are confronted with. Always show up and resist making quitting your first option.

Hindsight is a good teacher. It is often upon reflection that we realize that we should have or could have dealt with a

certain matter in a particular way. As young people, we are fortunate that we have enough space and time to correct our mistakes. In hindsight we become wiser and gain perspective which helps us to do better.

Integrity is very important in life in general. How many times do we hear someone whisper and say, no one was hurt and no one saw that so I took it or I did it? In order for us to build better lives and certainly a better South Africa, we must start choosing to do the right thing even if there is no one watching. Respect others and your environment. Pick up that piece of paper and throw it in the dustbin wherever you go — whether you are on the beach, at the mall and on your school grounds. Return the change that you received by mistake; pay back someone that you owe; do not take and keep the uniform that is unmarked. It does not belong to you. Learn to say 'thank you' and 'please'. It starts here, when you are young with little things.

When you are older, you will definitely know why it is important to be at work on time, to get your files ready because someone else depends on you so that they can do their job. As an accountant it is important to balance these books ethically. As a lawyer, ethically represent your clients. As a doctor, examine and diagnose your patients responsibly. As a teacher, be in class and teach. This kind of ethical behaviour will help you to do what is socially just and fair and to speak up when you see that things are not right. It takes courage, respect and mutual vulnerability. It should never come from a place of arrogance, but rather from a place of concern and honesty.

As you try to navigate this complicated world, I hope that you will find your passion so that you can choose something that will drive you for the rest of your life. There is nothing as sad as seeing people chasing money instead of their passion. You need to constantly ask yourself what your purpose is and how you can make this world a better place. Through that I believe that you will find your passion. Sometimes you find your passion through serving others and through that service you come up with brilliant ideas that can attract funding.

In conclusion, I believe that we must invest in your future so that we can have a better tomorrow with possibilities and opportunities — a future where every girl and boy can feel safe, free from any form of discrimination and abuse; where they can feel that they belong; where they feel that they have a chance in life, no matter what career they would like to pursue. If they choose to go to a TVET college, they will still get a decent job and be able to make a living, with possibilities of becoming entrepreneurs and help develop the economy of our country. I believe in your abilities to change the world and make it a better place for us all and future generations.

Ek draai weg en stap terug huis toe.





Ek is dankbaar vir elke leermeester wat my pad gekruis het, en weet dat ek by almal wat oor my pad kom, iets kan leer.











Olwethu Nodada, who matriculated in 2002, delivered an inspiring speech based on our school motto of 'Facta Non Verba'. She challenged the girls to work hard in order to achieve their dreams and goals. Olwethu is a well-known radio presenter, MC, voice-over artist, marketing specialist and community builder based in Cape Town.

After the assembly, we held a Flag Raising ceremony in the quad. The Grade Sevens from Collegiate Junior once again

joined us for this ceremony. The RCL members and our prefects took centre stage as the Head Girl of 2022, Liqhawe Nogampula, raised the school flag while our Concert Band, conducted by Mr Snyman, played the school song.

The Hostel parents ran the popular Farmers' Market and also served food and tea and coffee in The Games Club, as part of the hostel's annual fundraising.

FOUNDERS' DAY ASSEMBLY CELEBRATION



Founders' Day Address – Mrs L Erasmus

begin this Founders' Day assembly by paying tribute to a much-loved past member of staff and Head of Department, who would have taught many of you here today. Mrs Jacqui Abrey passed away on 19 July 2021 after suffering with Parkinson's disease and then PSP for about two years. She joined the Collegiate staff in 1987 and took early retirement in 2015 to travel world-wide with her retired husband, Bruce Abrey. Jacqui Abrey was a much-loved and respected Mathematics teacher and colleague, and she was always game for fun — especially acting in the staff performances at the Matric Dinners. If you are up near the Games Club this afternoon or tomorrow, you will find a bench on the side of the cricket field. Read the words on the back of the bench and you will hear in your mind the familiar voice of Mrs Abrey saying, 'Let's qo, Girls'.

I ask for a moment's silence to pay respect not only to the late Mrs Abrey, but also to those of the Collegiate Community – Old Girls and parents – who have passed away during the time of the pandemic of the past two years.

In 1962, 60 years ago, Miss Waterfield started her time as Headmistress of the school. Janet Powell was the Head Girl, and I am sure that she, as well as the Standard Tens of that year, had much to teach Miss Waterfield about Collegiate. In fact, at the end of the year, Miss Waterfield wrote:

I have been impressed, as I often have been before, by the willingness shown by such a large number of Collegiate girls to take considerable trouble to help those less fortunate than themselves, by their own hard work.

It is interesting to note the words written that year by the Standard Ten Editorial Committee of the School Magazine:

For us our departure from school marks the end of a long family association with the Collegiate. Here we have learnt the meaning of the 'hard right against the easy wrong'.

That is certainly an apt definition of what integrity entails, integrity being one of Collegiate's five values.

Fifty years ago, the 1972 Standard Ten Editorial group wrote:

We were not the last Matrics in the old School, nor were we the first in the new school. We do not seem to have anything to distinguish us from those who passed before and those who will come after us. We are the only ones who consider ourselves to be something special, but we must admit we might be prejudiced.

As an educator, I beg to differ. Schools are fairly predictable in that we follow a similar programme each year; we follow a daily timetable and are governed by bells; we see girls in the same uniform sitting in front of us each day. However, we see each girl as special – it is what motivates us each day – and when years have passed and we think back, it is not the great achievements that we remember, but the funny moments in class, the antics on camps, the note of appreciation written – that is special.



1982, 40 years ago, was Mrs Jenkin's final year as Headmistress of Collegiate. By all accounts one entered her presence with a certain amount of trepidation in that she was exacting in the standards that she demanded of staff and girls. She must have been just that, as the Boarders showed their mettle that year, winning sports day! However, she was also described as having remarkable serenity, quiet courage and wisdom, rare empathy and compassion. Her farewell words to the Class of 1982, were as true in 1982 as they are now: '... right through life you will have to make decisions, minor or major, and this is where I come to the words I should like to leave with you: Whatever you do, **think** carefully. Think before you speak, think before you write, think before you act.'

Thirty years ago, the Class of 1992 saw some changes to the school: the west wing extension 'rose like a phoenix from the ground' adding the Art Room and the Library/Media Centre. The original art room then became a cafeteria – the original lvy Leaf – and the library became the Auditorium. That original Art Room is now a fully equipped Drama Room and Dramatic Arts is one of our elective subjects. Five of the Class of 1992 made history that year: in 1980, Collegiate had opened its first pre-primary class and these five were the first matrics to have been at Collegiate from Grade 0! To give an indication of how the school has grown, last year there were 42 girls who had been at Collegiate from pre-primary to Grade 12.

Tarryn Fick, the 1992 Head Girl, ended her report with:

If it can be said of you that there were times when you didn't have time and yet you took the time. There were times when you had enough cares of your own and yet you cared. There were times when you had given all you had to give and yet you kept on giving, you will have discovered the power of being a person, the power of being you. And that nobody can take away.







1997 – the 25 years' reunion group. That year had the distinction of marking the end of the classical education. For 123 years Latin had been taught at Collegiate but sadly, changes in society had led to its demise. The 1997 Latin class of five girls have been immortalised in the annals of Collegiate in a photograph alongside an article entitled, 'Latin – R.I.P.' along with Cattullus' words – Atque in perpetuum …ave atque vale! Loosely translated as 'and forever, hail and farewell or I salute you and goodbye'. Head Girl Jeanette Nowell had a different farewell message to her class of 1997 – she ended her Valedictory message by quoting Art Garfunkel: 'Long as you are in my heart/ we'll never say goodbye'.

One 1997 Matric took Jeanette's words to heart, and has never said goodbye to Collegiate. Hayley Friskin, known to current girls as Mrs Carter, came back five years later in 2002 as the first PGCE student at Collegiate. She then came back to teach – went away and then came back again and is still here today. In fact, today is thanks to Mrs Carter who has overseen all the organisation for Founders' Day.

The 2002 Matric class has produced our guest speaker today – Olwethu. We look forward to hearing your message later. Hopefully, it is not as risqué as the Founders' Day speaker of 2002. Her speech was entitled: HOW TO KISS SUCCESSFULLY! I won't go into further detail!

Sadly, the Class 2002 has suffered the loss of a dear classmate, Catherine Dowley, nèe Thornton. Chanel Munro has sent the following message:

An indigenous Cheesewood Tree has kindly been donated by the class of 2002. This is in loving memory of one of the kindest most incredible souls, Catherine Dowley (nèe Thornton). This beautiful tree will hold her legacy and memory for years to come. May the friendships formed under its shade stand strong and true as she once did. Catherine, you will be missed and loved always.

The Class of 2002 is also donating a suitable bench to grace the refurbished old blue area for years to come. We thank you. Ten years ago, 2012, Mrs Bagshaw had been in the Principal's position for 6 months, a position the late Miss Pam Cameron-Ellis had held for twenty-six years. The School was entering a time of change in many areas, but something which stayed the same was the Collegiate Carols. This year, 2012, was the centenary year of the Collegiate Carols – 100 years and it still continues today (albeit it pre-recorded and shown online during COVID-19). There were many memorable moments in 2012 – Boarder flash mobs, excelling at the All Girls Festival in Potchefstroom, the introduction of the Grade Ten camp, cookie day and forgetting cookie day, 'The King and I', the new honours board recording the Head Girls of the School, the OCGG Reunion Dinner returning to the Stevenson Hall (and then departing the following year).

So, what has happened in the last ten years that you would find different from your memories of Collegiate?

- The School turned 140 in 2014 and hosted an All Girls' Schools Sport and Cultural Festival for the third year.
- The first male Deputy Principal, Derryk Jordan, was appointed in 2013 and served the school well until moving to the Principal position at Clarendon Park Primary School.
- The staff room was enlarged and the front office was remodelled to be more inviting.
- The library was revamped and modernised due to the financial generosity of Mrs Gill Gray, nèe De Wet, and the time and hard work of Sarah Bisdée (nèe Wilson).
- The original Art Room, which had become the old cafeteria/lvy Leaf and then converted to classrooms, is now a large Drama Room complete with theatre lights.
- The cottage between the pools has been converted to the Games Club.
- The College Girl shop has closed and the uniform outsourced to Birch's. The College Girl venue is slowly being converted to a Meeting/Boardroom.
- The Blue area flooring has been replaced and the area is now lighter with an air of spaciousness. Although now 'Beige', old names die hard so it is currently known as the 'old blue area'.



- Five courageous women canvasses are hanging in the old blue area. These promote our five values.
- Lizo Pemba's striking painting, 'Xhosa Wedding', commissioned in 2017, hangs in the same area.
- A selection of the girls' art pieces each year are printed, framed and then hung around the School.
- Girls' artworks now grace the Queen stairs and it is an honour for a girl to have her art work hanging there.
- The Transformation Task Team, mandated for a year at the end of 2016, resulted in the 'Comfortable in our Skins' policy.
- There is now a permanent Diversity, Inclusivity and Transformation Committee of the SGB.
- The Simamele forum has been introduced where learners discuss relevant but difficult topics in a structured way. If you pay a visit to the Resource Centre this morning, you will see the framed posters signed by the speakers of the first two Simamele forums.
- We have introduced a successful Educator-Internship position for a post-graduate student in financial need and from a previously disadvantaged group.
- There is a renewed focus on rolling up our sleeves facta non verba – and engaging with the community, be it through making love sandwiches, or giving of time to the St Augustine's Primary School library.
- We partner with the Guardian Company on Safeguarding our learners.

- We have a Wellness Department with two counsellors, one with a social work background, and a clinical psychologist, overseen by a Deputy Principal.
- The Hostel Dining room boasts a magnificent servery.
- The campus has borehole water and soon the school's plumbing will run on borehole water.
- The fences around the netball courts were removed bringing the game closer to the spectators.
- The 50-metre pool was condemned and then converted to a 25-metre pool (which is currently being repaired).
- We have a cricket pitch (not the real McCoy) and a successful Cricket Team.

The biggest change over the past ten years has been the development and implementation of a digital technology strategy. There is WIFI throughout the school and the hostel. Every teaching venue has a data projector and an Apple TV. Every girl has a device which in Grades 8 and 9 must be an iPad or MacBook. We are a Microsoft Teams school and this is the prime means of communication with the girls. When hard lockdown happened in 2020, we went straight to teaching a full timetable each day online using the MS Teams platform. In this, Collegiate has been at the forefront in Gqeberha and no doubt helped to achieve a 100% pass rate last year with 131 out of 134 bachelor passes. It is still our aim for every girl to attain a bachelor's pass. Perhaps this will be the year.





Looking forward, the 150 Jubilee is approaching rapidly and we truly would like as many old girls to join us at the Reunion in 2024. As you heard last night, the 'Where in the world is she?' initiative will soon be underway and wouldn't it be fantastic to connect with all the girls from your year? Please help us to find you all.

In 2024, the 150 Jubilee Celebration will last the entire year and will be marked in different ways. There is one project already underway. This is the '150 books for 150 years' project which aims to get as many people as possible reading and as many as possible to have read 150 books by 2024. It is also coupled with a community outreach project to promote and develop reading in the community, such as the project with St Augustine's Primary School. I would like to challenge you, too, to read '150 books for 150 years'.

I am so excited for the 150 Jubilee and could tell you more, but I know that by now you are probably no longer listening. So, I ask two things of you: 1) Participate in 'Where in the world is she?' and 2) Go to your calendar in Outlook and mark 2024 as the Big 150 celebration!

To end, I am going to refer to my remarks at the Founders' Day Assembly last year. I said that, 1991, now thirty-one years ago, is, I believe, the **second founding** of Collegiate. It is the year that Collegiate's Management team and the School

Committee grasped the opportunity to adopt a non-racial admission's policy and to open the doors to all children of South Africa, to act with **integrity**, one of our core values, and to start the new journey to becoming a united school of all races where all are comfortable in their skins. Journeys never really end — we just progress further down the road. Sometimes we hit potholes, and the scenery might change, but the values that drive the sisterhood of strong, confident girls, united in our diversity, remain.

Founders' Day Address - Olwethu Nodada

Good morning to our Headmistress, Deputies and all the Teachers of the College. A very warm greeting to all the Girls of the College, both current and old. To the parents and proud friends of the College, we are honoured to have you.

What a beautiful sight you all are on this very honourable and historic day.

I remember sitting with legs crossed just like each of the juniors at my very first assembly, then finally sitting on the chairs as a matriculant at my last assembly in 2002. When we sing the school song later, all of those memories will come flooding back. Some memories are an assurance that I have lived a purpose- filled life, and some are a question mark on whether I have left anyone behind in the pursuit of my dreams.

As a Collegiate girl, a girl of the College, an Old Girl (though I will refrain from referencing myself as one), we are cut from a different cloth. And that's not to say that we all come from the same homes, and face the same struggles. But rather, that the education we gain, or have gained here in these majestic halls, sets us apart in terms of grooming, purpose and identity.

My first day at Collegiate was in Grade Seven. My Mom had recently remarried and we had moved to Port Elizabeth. My initiation into primary school was at a boarding in school in KwaZulu Natal, where I had formed a stable sense of identity and mastered my pockets of excellence. Then I had to relocate, suddenly.

Before I give you the impression of a sad pre-teen, let me prefix this story with this. A 24-year-old Mom and wife, was widowed and left with her five-year-old baby girl to navigate through life, without any certainty of what the future would hold.

This 24-year-old young black woman, raised, educated, loved and supported this baby girl until she was 12 years old. She rooted her in kindness and hard work; in self-belief, tenacity and lots of glamour whilst supported by an army of sisters, girlfriends, aunts and grannies.

That 24-year-old was my mom, and she knew that when she was able to, she would plant me into a garden surrounded by strong women and diverse girls so that I could bloom to be the woman who stands before you today.

So yes, 1997 was a year of great change for me, standing in the hallways of the junior school with my mom fervently advocating for my last-minute admission. My hard work in KwaZulu Natal showed that I was indeed able and ready to be a girl of the College.

I do not tell this story purely out of sentiment, but with the purpose of sketching out what an intentional life means in carving out your purpose and leading a life of impact, most importantly how that leads to leaving a legacy that is



honourable. See, my foundation was that of sisterhood, unity and limitless possibilities. I was *always* a girl of the College, nurtured by deeds not words.

When I was asked to address all of you today, my heart instinctively went to our school motto, FACTA NON VERBA, deeds not words.

We are blessed with the unique position of not only being able to impact lives by our deeds, but to also positively change the trajectory of our school, our city, our country and yes indeed, even the trajectory of the world.

I would like to paint a picture of our privilege as girls of the College and then colour in the responsibility we have as a result of that privilege.

We have the experience of a diverse representation of our country, right here in this hall. Amongst us are young women of all races, with different cultural backgrounds, different family dynamics, a myriad of financial advantages and disadvantages and even gender identifications that are different.

When you sit in class, do you see your peers for all that they are or are we all magically the same when we don our school uniform?

What intentional conversations and experiences do you have with each other to help you gain a better understanding of the person sitting next to you?

I say we are privileged because we are given a roadmap to our identity through our school motto and the rules that we abide by when we enter those gates. That is a commonality that should be the equalizer.

But truthfully speaking it is not. When we open up our minds and hearts to receiving, learning and growing from the lived experiences that others have, we are then harnessing the true privilege of being a girl of the College. See, as part of our identity, empathy and kindness are at our core.

The responsibility that comes with that privilege is for us to learn from each other, and then go and teach others. That is a responsibility that we cannot pass onto others who have not have had the privilege of a diverse peer group at school.

It is such an important responsibility, as we are each a representation of a generation of mothers and grandmothers, of sisters and daughters. How we see and engage with the world shapes the world our children will live in.

There's a beautiful quote on identity by Chuck Palahnuik, that says 'Nothing of me is original. I am a combined effort of everyone I've ever known.' And more profoundly, here is a thought from Mahatma Ghandi; 'The best way to find yourself is to lose yourself in the service of others.'

We are a nation that still stands deeply divided, by race, culture, economic inequality, and I think more profoundly in our inability to see and hear each other. When we understand that, as uniquely and wonderfully made as we all are, our strength is in seeing our differences and finding our identity in our common purpose, which is to build not to destroy, to love and to be loved, and ultimately, to leave the world better than we found it.

What is a future without an understanding of the past and of course, an intentional molding of the present? I had to consult Google on the concise definition of the word future, and Google says, 'time as regarded as still to come'. That's not the clear definition I was looking for but I can work with it.

Still to come, I think is the phrase I will anchor my second last point on.

How do we work on a time that's yet to come by anchoring our actions in deeds not words?

I think our starting point is recognising the parts of the past and the present that we want to nurture; the roots we want to keep healthily watered.

Here are some that I think are important. *Courage* as shown in the history of our country: the courage to step into the face of what is wrong and stand firmly in what is right. *Integrity*, as shown by the leadership body of our school in my matric class.

Success as a school, as individuals and as a community is a root from the present that I definitely want to water and carry to a time yet to come.

What is required for success to be a reality in this time yet to come is for each of us to go relentlessly in the direction of our dreams.

So, our future is anchored in your courage to question the status quo and to strive for a life and a reality you would be proud to hand over to the generation that is to come. It is anchored in your being individuals with integrity, where you do the right thing even when no one else is watching.

Your success is the critical root in ensuring that the lives of those still to come are impacted positively by your lives. You cannot succeed if you play small, there is no reward in your shrinking so others are not intimidated by you. You also cannot succeed by bulldozing through life with an irresponsible arrogance. We all stand on the shoulders of giants; you cannot be one if you aren't anchored in humility and nurture others to thrive.

This brings me to my last thought. How are you making an impact and how do you continue to be of impact? When you initially think of impact, you may envision something colliding with something else and the impact of that collision causes a shift in the objects involved. I won't Google this one. I'll work on my understanding. How does your life, today or tomorrow, shift or change the position of someone else's life? Shift the position of this school, of the metro, the country and the world?

We are, erroneously, made to believe that in order to be of impact we must do one big thing! I believe that a collection of small things amasses to incredible impact.

I started off this talk with referencing my mom. What a solid example of rising above circumstance she is. She leads by example and the sheer power of will and conviction. I stand tall today because I stand on her very firm and stylish shoulders.

In case you are wondering, and for whatever reason, you have allowed the voices of naysayers and societal constructs to dilute your belief of what you can achieve as a woman, I just want to remind you that, as a woman, you do not need validation from anyone. You are already ahead of the curve, you are WOMAN, and that is your superpower.

There is not a single room that you will walk into that you are not deserving to be in. You may encounter some unfortunate souls who may try to undermine you, put you into a box of 'she's so emotional.' You are WOMAN, that is your superpower: the power of your femininity, your unique instincts, your sass, your kindness, your compassion and how passionate you are! Your greatness lies in your uniqueness. If you want to be great, go ahead and be great!
