ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

The Nelson Mandela District Class of 2023 Awards Ceremony was held yesterday. At this ceremony, Collegiate Girls' High School was recognised for Excellence in Mathematics, Physical Sciences, Accounting, Computer Applications Technology, Consumers Studies, English Home Language and Life Orientation in the category of Quintile 4 and 5 Schools. The awards go to the top performing school in those subjects. In addition, we attained an award for 100% pass rate, and, based on enrolment numbers and achievement, we were placed second in the district.
