That is the legacy we hope to give: one that can be lived out and passed on.

Legacy is not only what we leave behind, but how we live today. It is shaped in every act of integrity, every respectful conversation, every compassionate gesture. It is formed not just by great accomplishments, but also by great kindness.

As the holidays begin, may this be a time of rest and renewal. And as we return, may we do so with a renewed commitment to shaping tomorrow's legacy—together.

## **STAFF MATTERS**



A lifelong historian and author, she has contributed richly to preserving Knysna's heritage. Her vibrant memories of boarding at Collegiate — from crocodile walks to foam bath mishaps — remind us of the spirited sisterhood that binds generations. She fondly recalls life in St Michael's House, with just two hot baths a week, changing every evening for supper, and the dignified presence of Headmistresses Miss Tilley and Miss Brock, who always wore a long dress to dinner.

Whilst in Makhanda for the South African Girls' Schools' Conference, our Principal and Deputies were privileged to visit 98-year-old Mrs Millicent Armitage (née Pike). A proud boarder, prefect, Head of St Michael's House and First Team Hockey player during her years from 1939–1944, she still speaks with warmth of the values instilled at Collegiate. Remarkably, both women were boarders at the same time — a shared legacy that continues to inspire.

Our girls competed in a wide range of events: Hockey, Netball, Squash, Tennis, E-sports, Chess, Cross-Country, Creative Writing, Public Speaking, Masterchef, Visual Arts, Vocal Ensemble, and Drama.

Although the cultural events were non-ranking, they offered rich learning opportunities. Participants engaged in workshops led by professionals: the Visual Arts learners explored the medium of print-making, the Creative Writing group worked with a published author and the Drama students collaborated on performances with expert feedback. Masterchef participants enjoyed a unique culinary experience at Cape Town's world-renowned Silwood School of Cookery, while the Public Speaking and Vocal Ensemble groups represented the school with pride and confidence.

We were especially proud to be among the first schools to compete in the newly introduced **E-sports** category—our team, led by Mr McLachlan, won **first place overall**.

## Hockey

The hockey season kicked off even before Term Two officially began, with our teams participating in the highly anticipated **Bloemhof** and **St Mary's Hockey Festivals**. The U16A team travelled to Stellenbosch for the Bloemhof Festival, while the First Team competed in Johannesburg.

At St Mary's, the First Team played twelve matches, winning six, drawing three, and losing three, to finish a commendable nineteenth overall out of thirty-two teams. The U16A team performed superbly at Bloemhof, winning six of their ten matches, drawing three, and losing only once to finish in a shared third place with Rhenish.

Shortly after the start of term, **EP trials** took place across all age groups. We are extremely proud of the twenty-six Collegiate girls who were selected for various Eastern Province teams, with an additional four girls chosen as non-travelling reserves. Over the weekend of 10–11 April, our teams travelled to Stellenbosch for derby matches against **Bloemhof** and **Rhenish**. Both schools are well-known for their strong hockey programmes. Although we experienced some narrow losses, our girls fought hard and delivered competitive performances. The First Team secured a notable 1–1 draw against Rhenish, the number one ranked side in the country, and beat Bloemhof 2–1. The U14A team also recorded a win over Bloemhof, while the U16A and U14C teams earned draws.

Our next derby was against **Alexander Road High School**, where our lower teams made us proud with strong performances.

A new addition to the calendar this year was the **Belgotex Girls' Challenge**, where the U14A, U16A, and

First Teams competed against top hockey schools from around the country in full-length matches. The U14A's finished thirteenth out of sixteen teams, the U16A's placed fifth, and the First Team also finished fifth out of twenty teams—an excellent achievement, having lost only one match.

During **Founder's Weekend**, we hosted **Union High School** from Graaff-Reinet. A festive spirit filled the weekend, with all our hockey teams delivering pleasing results.

In our **Woodridge Derby**, fixtures were split between Collegiate and Woodridge. The U16B, Second, and Third teams played at Woodridge and all earned victories. At home, the U14A, U16A, U14B and our First team secured solid wins.

The **Kingswood Derby**, hosted at Collegiate this year, saw closely contested matches. All our teams emerged victorious in what were competitive and enjoyable encounters.

The **Pearson Derby** took place in Port Elizabeth, with most of the First Team matches played under lights on the Friday evening. High-intensity matches saw the U14A, U16A, and First Team showcase stellar performances to secure wins.

We concluded the term with our **DSG Derby**, a home fixture. Known for their competitive sides, DSG delivered a strong showing. Across the weekend, Collegiate teams won four matches, drew two, and lost three.

We are extremely proud to announce that our U14A, U16A and First team hockey teams are in the top twelve teams in the country. Only five other schools in South Africa achieved this triple achievement and we cannot be more privileged to be the leading hockey school in the Eastern Cape.



#### Netball

Term Two was a packed one for netball.

We opened with the **Rhenish Derby**, where our teams travelled to Stellenbosch. In addition, friendly fixtures were played against Somerset College. Teams that were not involved in the Rhenish Derby participated in the **Framesby Tournament**.

Further derbies took place against **Andrew Rabie**, which was held on our Founders Day Weekend, **Brandwag**, **Kingswood**, **Pearson**, **DSG**, and **Nico Malan**.

Collegiate also participated in the NMMS League, with matches against Otto du Plessis, Despatch, Brandwag, Pearson, and Framesby.

Both our First Team and U15A Team finished third overall in the league.



## **Cross Country**

Three league races were held this term. The team also competed in the **Rhenish Derby**, against **Union High** on Founder's Day, and in the **All Girls' Festival** in Wynberg. At Rhenish, Olivia Freecks was the top Collegiate finisher, placing eighth overall in a notoriously challenging event. The team showed excellent improvement from previous years.





