

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FROM THE HEADMISTRESS'S DESK



Dear Girls, Old Girls, Staff, Parents and Friends of the School With the ending of each year, one tends to look back and reflect on the events of the year. That is the charge of this annual School Magazine: as you turn the pages so you will be drawn into "celebrating 149 years". It will soon be clear to you that a "normal" year at Collegiate, is incredibly busy, exciting, happy and vibrant. How wonderful it has been to witness the joy experienced as a goal was scored; the beauty of each Matric walking on the red carpet towards the Matric Dance; the cheering on Athletics Day; the pride on receiving a Blazer Award; and the significance of ordinary moments of being in a classroom and engaging in the process of learning. 2023 enters the history of Collegiate as a year when all can say, "That was a job well done"!

My reflection, however, goes further than what is between the pages of this magazine. It falls on the ethereal experience of the recent 111th Carols Service held in our magnificent quad. So much of what Collegiate is lives through the Carols and the service of the girls who do not sing carols: our motto, facta non verba; good work ethic – many hours spent practising; compassion for those in great need; responsibility to the community; respect for the history and traditions that follow on from year to year. As I gazed upon the girls raising their voices, felt the music feeding my soul and the prayers bringing peace, so I realised why it is always Carols that returning old girls remember – it is the togetherness experienced while shoulder to shoulder on the stands, the sisterhood that shines through and the intangible sense of being part of what has gone before and is still to come.

Now my reflection turns to "what has gone before and what is still to come". Our grand old lady, Collegiate, is on the eve of her sesquicentenary, of turning 150 years! The excitement is mounting, just as it was ten years ago on the eve of turning 140. Whilst 2014 itself was an important milestone for Collegiate, it was also a time of looking towards 2024. It was a time to ensure that the grand old lady moved with the times, while staying true to herself; that the grand old lady remained a values-driven place of excellence and community involvement; that the grand old lady would continue to give girls the confidence required to take on the world and lead in a changing society; that the grand old lady would have the facilities to achieve in the academic and cultural spheres, the STEAM field, and sport; that the grand old lady would be enriched in diversity.

Is the grand old lady ready? Has she moved with the times in the past ten years, while staying true to herself? My reflection leads me to an emphatic, "Yes"!

In 2014 the Collegia Trust Legacy 2024 Project was launched with the aim of providing for real growth and delivery of exceptional education for girls to produce South Africa's future leaders through the funding of facilities, educational and community programmes at the Collegiate Girls' High School. This was a

clear looking to the future. Whilst the Legacy 2024 Project has not yet reached the sustainable target, it is a vehicle through which Old Girls and donors can contribute to achieving this goal, and many have done so.

In addition, the master plan for the campus development was finalised, and this has guided decisions over the past decade. Within the school, the Gill Gray Media Centre was renovated into a modern Resource Centre. The reception area was remodelled to be welcoming to all who enter, the staffroom enlarged, a staff workroom and printing room created, the computer labs extended, the IT management area created, a boardroom added, the old blue area flooring replaced with modern flooring, and the cloakrooms modernised. The Digital Technology strategy has ensured that Collegiate is fully-functioning for the cyber-age and the addition of a generator keeps the lights on!

On the greater campus, cricket nets have been added to cater for this growth sport, re-introduced ten years ago after an absence of almost a century. The hockey astro has been upgraded to a water-based astro and a mini-astro added. The water polo pool is soon to be heated, a fitness centre will be opened as one of the 150 Jubilee projects, and we

are looking to add lights to the netball courts.

A great addition has been the conversion

of the cottage to The Games Club where gatherings take place. More plans will be revealed in the new year which will make this the social hub for learners, parents, staff and old girls.

We have also made the grand old lady more accessible with the addition of wheel-chair ramps and accessibility bathrooms, and the gardens have sprung to life with the aid of borehole water and the loving hands of landscapers. Waterfield House, too, has become an even more welcoming home from home for the learners from out of town. A modern servery was added to the dining room, and the gardens replanted around a braai pit.

Girls' artworks adorn the corridors, Lizo Pemba's *Xhosa Wedding*, and the five courageous women who reflect our values, grace the walls of the main foyer, and our "Comfortable in our Skins" philosophy honours our diversity, unites and ignites the Collegiate of tomorrow.

Throughout this time, we have added to our academic offering with the introduction of Information Technology, and we have cemented our reputation of a top-class academic school, maintaining a 100% National Senior Certificate pass rate each year, a grade average above 70%, numerous provincial award representatives, and being the school with the highest number of subject distinctions in the province.

Our Music Department has continued its standard of excellence throughout the past decade. Each year it nurtures exceptional talent, both individually and in the Concert Band, various Ensembles and Choir. With six full-time teachers and one part-time Music teacher, we are in dire need of realising the vision of a Performing Arts Music Centre, to take the grand old lady to the next level. I encourage you to visit the Advancement and Development section on our website, where you can the view the vision document and watch the fly-through of the proposed Music Centre, while listening to the recording that placed our Wind Band first the 2021 in the Classical International Youth Music Competition. Imagine if out of the 150 Jubilee year, this vision becomes a reality and we are able to break ground for the Music Centre.

Ending my reflection on the past ten years, I am confident that the grand old lady is standing proud for her

sesquicentennial celebration. We are ready to open the year with the hoisting of the 150

flag at a dedication assembly, to launch our high and junior schools' celebra-

tions at a prestigious function hosted by the Principals, to unveil our Fitness Centre, hold a STEAM Week, a musical production, a Literary Festival, a Wellbeing Conference, a Netball Festival, an U15 Spring Sports' Festival of Water Polo, Tennis, Cricket and Rapid Chess, and to conclude the St Augustine's and 150 Books for 150 Years projects. We are also looking forward to an exciting Founders' and Reunion Week from 6 to 12 May 2024 when we will welcome our old girls, parents, supporters and friends of the College onto our campus to celebrate the grand old lady with an array of festivities.

Before ending, I would like to pay tribute to the wonderful staff of Collegiate who go beyond the ordinary and pour passion into their work, be it tending to the gardens, the friendly welcome at the guardhouse, or teaching, coaching and guiding the learners of Collegiate. In addition, the members of the School

Governing Body give willingly of their time and expertise for sound governance of the School, and I thank them for this. A special tribute to Mrs Liesl Nienaber, the Chairman, Mr Angus de Beer, ITC, and Mrs Claire Coleman, Human Resources, whose terms end with the matriculation of their daughters. You have served Collegiate well. Thank you to the Editor, Mrs Hayley Carter, her Assistant Editor, Mrs Lynn van Dyk, and the Magazine Team who have also served Collegiate well by producing this fine record of a successful year.

To end, my thoughts turn to the magnificent 19th century stained-glass window by Clement Heaton, that graces the landing of the main staircase of the school. This has been lovingly restored by local stained-glass artist, David Manning, and the light now streams through the glass, enhancing the beautiful colours and images. It reminds us that reframing and securing the historical aspects of Collegiate, lights our path to the possibilities of the future.

I wish you all a relaxing holiday and a blessed festive season. May God bless you and keep you safe until we meet again. Mag God jou in die palm van sy hand hou. Uxolo malube nani.

STAFF REPORT

FAREWELL TO EUNETTE STOLTZ



On 12 March 1993, the then Principal of Collegiate, the late Miss Ellis, sent Mrs Eunette Stoltz a letter offering her the Afrikaans post from April that year. In it, she wrote: "We hope that you will have a long and happy association with the Collegiate and we look forward to welcoming you to the school next term." Thirty years, later, we can confirm that Mrs Stoltz has indeed had a long and happy association with the Collegiate. In her application letter for the position, Mrs Stoltz had written, "Indien my aansoek suksesvol is, verseker ek u

van my heelhartige ondersteuning aan u skool." [Should my application be successful, I assure you of my wholehearted support of your school.] Mrs Stoltz has shown that she is a person who keeps her word and has been fully committed to Collegiate and the welfare of Collegiate learners past and present throughout the past thirty years.

During her time at Collegiate, Mrs Stoltz has fulfilled many roles and has done so with commitment and to the best of her abilities. She has coached Netball, been involved in Athletics, run Power-Walking, Cross Country, Road-Running and Synchronised Swimming.

Mrs Stoltz also had the unenviable task of being the



Detention teacher for a number of years and I am certain that all were treated fairly, but none escaped.

Over the years, Mrs Stoltz has also been a Grade Head of several grades, Nine, Eleven and Twelve, and shown understanding and firmness with the learners in the grade.

Other areas of involvement have been running the Grade 11 camp, the awarding of Deportment girdles, organising a highly successful Cultural Assembly, being involved in the Matric Dinner and

the entertainment for it – and much more.

In 1999, Mrs Stoltz was made the Subject Head of Afrikaans and ran the Afrikaans Department with precision for twenty-one years. Never one for the limelight, Mrs Stoltz has quietly got on with whatever task was assigned to her without any fuss or bother, conducting herself at all times with grace and tact. To use the words of the late Ingrid Scholtz: "This is a teacher who is held in high regard by peers and pupils alike." (2003)

The then Headmistress, Miss Ellis, assured Mrs Shaw that it would be for a short time only.

Always humble, Mrs Shaw did not want any farewell or fuss to be made over her. She said she arrived quietly and will

leave quietly. However, it is always fitting to pay tribute to one who has given so much so selflessly to so many.

For the first few years at Collegiate, Mrs Shaw taught only Mathematics before moving into Geography in 2009 and taking over as subject head of Geography in 2014. Passionate about bringing her subject to life, Mrs Shaw has been on many Geography outings, camps and rafting trips down the Orange River (and tutored Maths).

For several years, Mrs Shaw was the Grade Head for Grade



Eight pupils and her welcoming nature and constant positivity made each new girl feel very quickly that she belonged at Collegiate. Mrs Shaw taught the girls the values of respect, service and gratitude not only through words, but by example. Mrs Shaw was the House Head of Queen Mary House and tackled this task with vigour.

A natural teacher, Mrs Shaw exercises great patience and has always been willing to spend time in the afternoons assisting girls who might be struggling academically. This carried over into

the Hostel where Mrs Shaw has assisted many boarders at evening prep over a number of years.

Teaching is always so much more than academic work and much about life is learnt through extra-murals. Mrs Shaw has spent many hours on the sports fields with pupils teaching them skills and then accompanying them to their sports fixtures. Her wonderful gift of encouragement would uplift the girls and she would take delight in celebrating their success. At Collegiate she has coached Hockey, Athletics, Swimming,

supervised Public Speaking at All Girls Festivals and managed teams on many tours, not only locally, but also internationally. What a privilege it was for the Hockey teams in 2011 and 2013 to travel to Holland with Mrs Shaw, a former South African Hockey player herself.

I first met Heather Shaw when I started teaching in 1988 at Victoria Park High School. We both taught Mathematics then and Heather gave me, a new teacher, much guidance. This first experience and my impression of Heather as kind, energetic and inspiring with a keen sense of fun, has lasted

through the years, and I am sure will continue into her retirement ventures.

Mrs Shaw has been a stalwart at Collegiate, has served the teaching profession well and touched many lives. She is hardworking, level-headed, loyal and caring, with many stories to tell in a witty and heartfelt way. We wish her well for her adventure and we know she will continue to touch lives and bring joy, always.



Point 4: Always seek to do the right thing:

- Be honest:
- · Be responsible;
- Be respectful of others and ALWAYS, ALWAYS act from a position of integrity.

Point 5: Strength comes from within.

- Get to know yourself;
- · Look within your heart and soul;
- Draw from your inner being and you will be able to take on the world with confidence.

If you do all this, leaning on the values instilled in you, you will be able to say one day, I have done my best, I have fulfilled my purpose, I have made the world a better, kinder and healthier place.





On 21 June, the Grade Six learners from Collegiate Junior School spent the day with us. They thoroughly enjoyed being in the Jubilee Lab learning about the movement of particles due to kinetic energy, as well as making their own underwater rain.

On 31 July, some of our Grade Eleven learners celebrated National Science Week with a visit to the Nelson Mandela University's Zoology Department. They were treated to a tour through the in-house aquarium and practical laboratories and experienced what student life may be like in the not too distant future.

We were privileged to have two lecturers from the University College in Dublin, Ireland, visit us in Term Two. Professor Jeremy Simpson (Dean of Science) presented a lecture on a method to explore cell function and therapeutic delivery of medicine using nanoparticles, in other words, how medicine can be programmed to target only those cells that are ill or cancerous, instead of all cells in the body. Learners were also surprised to learn how extensively technology, in the form of robots, is being used in the laboratory.

Professor Eleni Mangina, also from University College, discussed the various uses of augmented reality, as well as how to create one's own content. Learners were mesmerised by the 'HoloLens 2', which allows one to explore holographic images in 3-D. The life-sized images that learners were able to explore included the skeletal, muscular and nervous systems. The application of this technology in schools, although expensive, would change the way learners perceive 2-D information in a textbook.

We look forward to future engagements with University College Dublin.

Many Grade Eight and Nine learners competed in the Natural Sciences Conquesta, a longstanding Olympiad in South Africa.

The Natural and Physical Sciences Department provides teacher-tutoring for learners every Tuesday afternoon from 14h20 until 15h00. Learners are encouraged to book an alternative time with the teacher involved if they are unable to attend the Tuesday slot. There are also senior learners who provide tutoring to junior learners through the 'Studying Sisterhood' when required.




In today's fast-paced digital world that fights for the attention of people, the rebirth of Collegiate's school's newspaper was warmly received as a means to reconnect as a school community.

Grade Twelves, those of you who attended Collegiate Junior School, are the last of Mrs Robinson's girls that went through her watch from Grade One (some even Grade 00) to Grade Seven. No doubt, Mrs Robinson is looking forward to celebrating with you in your achievements. Finally, a very special welcome goes to the Collegiate staff, the 2023 and 2024 Prefects, all the award winners and their parents, the Grade Eleven and Twelve learners, and the Matric parents who have joined us tonight. It is such a privilege to come together as a community, a Collegiate Community, and to celebrate together. Welcome, one and all.

As I share with you my reflection on the past year in the life of what is now a 149-year "grand old lady" as I so fondly call our beautiful school, I am awash with a variety of emotions: joy, pride, gratitude, humility, compassion, love and excitement. I am so proud of our learners and especially of the class of 2023 here tonight. This group entered the year in the aftermath of the storms of last year that shook our institution and left scars on our community. It is this group who were called upon to exercise maturity and act with integrity as we reframed certain events during the year. They rose to



the occasion, and I can truly stand here and salute them. For the most part, they honoured their pledge, signified by the wearing of their Matric Badge, to uphold our five values of Responsibility, Respect, Good Work Ethic, Compassion, and especially Integrity. Thank you, Grade Twelves.

Good work ethic is a bedrock of any school that strives for academic excellence, and the good work ethic of the Grade Twelve class of 2022 gave rise to a 100% pass rate, 94,6% Bachelor passes with 141 of 149 Matrics securing entrance to university degree programmes, with the remaining eight securing Diploma passes. The grade average was an impressive 70,3%. 16,8% received A aggregates, three learners had eight distinctions, six had seven and there were 290 subject distinctions in total. This earned us the MEC Award for the Top Quintile 5 School with the most distinctions in the Eastern Cape Province. As we are by no means the largest school in the province, this is an impressive achievement. Robyn Hechter, the Dux Scholar of the class of 2022, received the award for the top learner in the Nelson Mandela Bay District with all seven of her subjects well over 90%. Of course, this was after the two Grey learners from our brother school were taken out of the mix, having placed in the top three in the province. Well done, Mr Erasmus, on this achievement of your two gentlemen.

Ladies and gentlemen, you can rest assured that academic excellence continues to epitomise Collegiate, and the good work ethic established during their school years will go with your daughters through their lives and can be applied in everything that they put their hands to.

This year, the Academic Portfolio Prefect and her committee put their hands to introducing a study skills workshop for Grade Eights and Nines. The Grade Eights and Nines who attended benefitted from the experience of their older Collegiate sisters. In addition, the 'Studying Sisterhood' which started last year continued and the peer mentoring and tutoring that this provides is of immense value.

Nothing in life should be a silo, so our Academic learners take



their talent into the community and tutor learners at St James RC Secondary School for Girls situated in Schauderville. This group of tutors, known as S2, benefits as much from the engagement with the St James girls in an environment other than the privileged Collegiate one, as the St James girls benefit from being tutored in Physical Sciences, Life Sciences and Mathematics. Thank you, Studying Sisterhood and S2 group, for living out our school motto, *Facta non Verba*.

Facta non Verba runs in the blue blood of Collegiate learners, and many groups within the school involve themselves in community outreach. The groups and their deeds are too many to mention, and there is always the consideration that guiet selfless service by its nature desires no recognition, even though it deserves it. Thus, we recognise the hours that have been given by our Hockey players running a field Hockey clinic at Charles Duna Primary School in New Brighton; the hours spent at St Augustine's Primary School in Central on the "150 Books" project of renovating the library; the hours spent beach cleaning and removing alien plants, by our eco warriors; the hours spent knitting and sewing together squares for the 67 blankets projects; the hours spent at Mosaic centre in Walmer; the hours given to visiting the Nazareth House Old Age Home, Love Story, Animal Welfare, the Eastern Province Child and Youth Care Centre; the hours given to the Charity Bazaar where the girls raised R56 133.55 for the Herald Christmas Cheer initiative; the hours given by the Music learners visiting Laubscher Park West Retirement Village to spread joy through musical performances, especially of 'Bohemian Rhapsody' by the newly formed 'C of the Saxes' ensemble; and so many more hours given to so many more in the greater community.

To continue on a musical note, our musicians have continued to excel with many achieving distinctions in Trinity College of

London examinations on numerous instruments. Those who participated in the Pearson Praeludium came away with a collective 11 Diploma (Double-Gold), 23 Gold, 10 Silver and 2 Bronze awards. There were also learners who were finalists in the SASMT 'Into the Mix' Contemporary and Jazz Music Competition, and others who performed in the finalists' concert of the annual SASMT competition. The Choir performed in the Choir Festival at Hoogland DRC; the Choral Celebration Festival Series at the Feather Market Centre; and were placed third in the Cantamus Choir Competition in George last term.

Other highlights were the String Ensemble participating in the Grey High School Strings Festival, the Bands Festival, the Vocal Ensemble's *Broadway: Round the Clock, a Century of Song,* and the Musical Moments Concert. We were also treated to the *Musical Maestros' Concert* which revealed that our Music Department does not only have Music educators, but talented musicians in their own right. How wonderful it would be if we could soon realise our vision and plans for a much-needed Music and Performing Arts Centre on our campus.

Moving on from the academics of the mind, the outreach of the heart, and the music of the soul, we come to the sport of the body. And what an amazing and exciting sporting year it has been. The Cricket Team has benefitted from the addition of practice nets to our campus, and the team has shown this past month that they are a team on the rise. There are exciting plans for Cricket in 2024 in line with Women's Cricket being a growth sport in the country and worldwide. Our Tennis team braved the heat of the recent Sun City Tennis tournament and have returned stronger from the experience. Collegiate had a number of learners represent Eastern Province in the following codes: 18 Hockey Representatives, 9 Water Polo Representatives, 5 Squash Representatives, 5 Swimming













Representatives, 3 Artistic Swimming Representatives, 3 Cricket Representatives, 1 Athletics Representative, 1 Cross Country Representative and 1 Netball Representative, not to overlook the EP Reps or similar, in non-school sports such as the Equestrian disciplines, Lifesaving, Martial Arts, Indoor Hockey, Rhythmic Gymnastics, Irish Dancing to mention a few. Sport is certainly top-class at Collegiate. We are especially proud of Tiara Finnis who continues to swim at an international level: Aneesah Lindoor who competed for South Africa at the World Aquatics Youth Championships for Artistic Swimming last term; Cassidy Williams who has been selected to the South African U16B Hockey side: Elizabeth Porter who attended the South African Ladies Indoor Hockey selection camp; and Emma Jack, Likhanye Jam Jam, Elizabeth Nicol and Jemma van der Mescht who participated in the World Gymnaestrada 2023 in Amsterdam.

A highlight for Hockey was the First Team placing fourth in the St Mary's, Waverley Hockey Festival in April, and the First and U16A Hockey teams being invited to the respective Top Twelve Tournaments, and the U14A Hockey team to the Rising Stars Festival. The First Hockey team finished the year ranked seventh in the country. For Netball, the highlight was placing sixth at the St Andrew's Netball Festival and hosting our second U19 Netball Festival in July.

A further highlight not only for Hockey and Netball, but for Squash, Tennis, Cross Country and Chess was the return of the Annual All Girls' Schools' Sport and Cultural Festival hosted by Eunice Girls' High School in Bloemfontein at the end of April. Joining those mentioned sports on the buses to the City of Roses, were the following: Debating, Creative Writing, Visual Arts, Drama, and Master Chef. What a wonderful Festival it was, and I was thrilled by the camaraderie amongst the girls and the support for each other.

Camaraderie was also evident in the annual Inter-House One

Act Play Festival. The Festival allowed for our creatives to pen original scripts based on the theme of a *sci-fi series on Netflix*. As the curtains parted and performers trod the boards, it was clear that much collaboration and enjoyment had been had by all, and that Drama is alive and well at Collegiate.

Not only is Drama alive and well at Collegiate, so it is at our brother school. Grey High School hosted *Almost Maine* in July, and Collegiate learners joined the cast and crew. The calibre of the acting, the beautifully crafted production and the evident enjoyment of the cast and crew made for a 'feelgood' night. There is a much pride in reporting on the exceptional manners of the Collegiate learners who attended as audience members. It was one of the many events where one felt immensely honoured to be part of the College, as well as part of the Collegiate-Grey community.

Our greater community extends across our fields to Collegiate Junior, too, and there was much excitement when our Grade Six sisters came to High School for the morning and had a taste of high school life. They spent time with the Grade Twelves and experienced Science experiments in the Jubilee Lab, participated in a Consumer Studies practical, learnt some French, had a theatrical experience, loved the Art Room and played dodgeball in the Gym Hall. We look forward to 2025 when they will take their place as Collegiate Grade Eights.

A vital part of our community is the parent body and during the course of the year we have had several casual get-togethers at the Games Club of parents and staff members. These have provided an opportunity to create connections and to bring a greater sense of belonging to the Collegiate community. At the most recent get-together, we officially formed a PTA with Jacques Pienaar as Chairman, and we are excited for this group to be the launch pad for greater parental involvement in many areas, and especially in our exciting







150th year to come.

Turning from the people to the place, I am pleased to report that much attention has been paid to our facilities. Along with Collegiate Junior, we upgraded the original Hockey Astro of fifteen years to a water-based Astro. At the same time, we re-purposed the old carpet to construct a Mini-Astro. This allows our tiny sisters to play Mini-Hockey on a scaled-down Astro, while also providing a much-needed warm-up facility for the older Hockey players at both the Junior and High schools.

The now-functioning borehole has given life to the gardens as has the blessing of the recent rains. The gardens are being replanted and new life and beauty surrounds us, creating such a beautiful campus. Within the school, the transformation of the old 'College Girl Shop' into a boardroom fully equipped with technology for long-distance meetings was completed and the boardroom is proving its worth. Also proving its worth is the investment into a generator to keep the lights and power on during the unwelcome occurrence of loadshedding. We are most grateful and relieved to have this privilege.

We are also grateful to have had the means, along with some donations from Old Girls, to be able to restore the priceless Heaton, Butler and Bayne stained-glass window that dates back to 1892. Its beauty shines brightly once more above the landing of the main staircase.

The various bathrooms are being updated in turn and the girls are to be commended on their fundraising efforts to renovate the Matric bathrooms. A big investment has gone into building a workshop and store for the Estate. In turn, this has made available an area for an exciting development.

But it is here that I pause, as it is time to turn from reflecting on the year that has been to the year that is to come. The year the grand old lady turns 150 – our special jubilee year.

The plans for the year have been several years in the making and arise from the **VISION** of **CELEBRATION** and **FUTURE LEGACY**. 2024 is to be a year of **CELEBRATION**

- · of all who have been through the School
- of all its achievements
- of friendships and connections

It is also to be a year of looking to the **FUTURE** through the **legacy we create and leave for the future**. It is to be a year in which the Collegiate community worldwide unites and ignites the Collegiate of tomorrow.

Last term we issued the 150 Jubilee Celebration Year Plan and if you have studied it, you will have caught a glimpse of the enormously exciting year that lies ahead. From the Dedication Assembly on the first day of Term One, to the Thanksgiving Assembly in November, we will be on-the-go and marking the year in so many ways. It is not the time now

to go into all the events – a glimpse is sufficient – but I will speak of one of the campus projects and that is of the Fitness Centre and the hub of The Games Club. The store area behind the Games Club has now moved to the newly built workshop and store. In the next month, work will start on converting this area into a Fitness Centre for the use of all our sporting codes, boarders and more. There will be strength-training facilities and a Bio-Kineticist. We will also be opening access from the Water Polo arena to The Games Club to to make it possible to enjoy the intended Games Club coffee shop during Water Polo events. Is that not exciting? And that is but one of the projects that will be realized.

Staying focused on the 150 Jubilee year, but returning to the values I highlighted at the start of my address, I am honoured and delighted to announce our patron for our sesguicentennial year, who will be at our Founders' Week celebrations and who will deliver the inaugural lecture which is to become an annual event. We are a values-driven educational institution; we must plant the values and allow them to take root in our learners to equip them to make the world around them a kinder, more accepting, more compassionate world, where every action that they take is respectful, inclusive and comes from a place of integrity. It, thus, gives me great pleasure to announce that our patron for our 150th year, is one whose life embodies all five of our values. She is the former Public Protector of South Africa, former Full-Time Law Commissioner and current Chair of Social Justice at the University of Stellenbosch and founder of the Thuma Foundation for Democracy Leadership and Literacy. Several years ago, she was chosen by Collegiate learners as one whose words illustrate responsibility: "Those of us who believe in a better world must be the first to do what is right or needs to be done to achieve such a world." Her words and portrait hang in our fover. She is none other than the esteemed Professor Thuli Madonsela and we look forward to welcoming her to our campus in 2024.

On that revelation, I reach my conclusion. Tonight, we celebrate achievement, spirit and good character through the awards that will be made. My congratulations to those who have excelled and who will be honoured tonight.

I wish to thank the staff of Collegiate for their time and commitment to the girls of this school. Our academic, sporting, administrative, finance, support, hostel and security staff have the girls of this school as their number one priority. Without the dedication and hard work of these people, Collegiate would not be the great school which it is.

I also wish to pay tribute to our Governors who work tirelessly in the interest of this school. They give the School so much of their time and expertise, and for that we are most grateful.

Ladies and gentlemen, special guests – thank you for being here tonight and I hope that you enjoy the proceedings.

I was his muse and a creature worth writing about with mystical whimsicality, but how long would it be until he realized that the fairy creature he pinned to his cork board was nothing but a fake? I didn't want to wait for him to find out. I sawed off my wings with the blunt tips of my tinfoil silver nails and I hobbled out of his life, ugly, bloody, and free. His love for me terrified me, and I did everything in my power to diminish it. I was cruel

and unkind and everything that his poems of me were not. It was a simple poem, comprised of seven lines. I read through each one and felt my heart bloom with regret — not for leaving him, but for doing so with the cruelty that I did. The last line sits printed above my desk to this day: "To those who love you next, I pray they do it better than I did." And to this day, I doubt that anyone ever will. Reading that poem, truly, as the skies opened to a once dreary part of my youth, I felt a rush of bittersweet gratitude overwhelm me.


Ready. Set. Go.





Just like canvases, role models come in all shapes and sizes. We look up to others in the same way that apprentices look up to master artists, not to mimic their techniques completely, but to see what beauty they've been able to create from the blurred and rich hues of chaos, serenity, and despair, how they did it, and to build the belief that we can do the same. They give us a strong sense of direction and influence our paths in life, as well as our development of character. As a young and inquisitive apprentice, I've always looked up to my master artist: my grandfather. There's something special about having a blood relative as a role model. He was, in my opinion, both an artist and a work of art. He had ageing hands that showed the marks of many years of hard work, where time had broken his porcelain skin into a mosaic, but remained mended with love running richly in between the cracks. He had made something great of himself with all that he had – which was initially very little. My grandfather was an orphan of Italian descent, and through hard work and dedication sold art commissions to pay his university fees, and eventually became a senior buyer for a toy company while still pursuing art on the side. Art styles were never meant to be consistent, neither was life. Just like the wrinkles in his skin, rippling through his complexion, he took the tides of life as he saw it. He taught me that I must learn to trust the process, as every artist must. Even if his life had looked too distorted and sometimes even dull, he always held the belief that he would ultimately be able to compose something to tie these imperfections together perfectly, and to create something articulate and beautiful from himself, for himself and for others. He showed kindness to the world.

layers of his life lay a gentle soul. He was a well-read and well-grounded man, which I believe is so important for me and others to develop. Friends and family alike would seek his counsel, and he'd take them under his wing and bide his time reinventing and restoring them, helping them to turn themselves into their own masterpieces.


He created a loving home, and held a love that was so strong and so vibrant, that when he used to hug me or pat me on the back, I was convinced that my being had previously been in monochrome. It was so strong, that it still runs thickly through the veins of my mother, brother and me. My grandfather's resilience, and how he remade himself after suffering a stroke and losing his most vivid, erratic hue – his capacity to converse – was what I respected the most about him. The most difficult form of love to master is that which is unspoken. There are more actions than there are words. yet my grandfather was one of the few people who could master such a broad and nuanced language. He is my role model because he was the epitome of the phrase: "Rome was never built in a day". He managed to compose his life beautifully as an apprentice without a master artist, and left beautiful finishing touches to the souls of those for whom he cared. It'll be difficult to find a person like him in my life again, but if I can be like him in the lives of others, I wouldn't go looking elsewhere, because then I would know that I've created something from myself, for myself and for others. I attempt to see past the murky hues that have corrupted the composition of my spirit in the mess of colours thrown upon the palette of my life. The more I examine my palette, the more I notice the deep undertones of my grandfather's love and spirit that he had laid out for me as a child. I painted with my grandfather's ghost through sunsets and sunrises for many years after he died, and although my maestro was known as Sulaiman Kara, I sat with him long enough to learn that his real name was love.





FOUNDERS' DAY ASSEMBLY CELEBRATION





Founders' Day Address - Mrs L Erasmus

One hundred and fifty years ago, in 1873, a group of Port Elizabeth residents met to discuss establishing a school for their daughters. The Grey had been established in 1856 for their boys and it was time for a school for girls. Their plans bore fruit and the Collegiate School was founded in 1874.

Last night we enjoyed a fantastic Old Girls Reunion Dinner in this Hall. In 1910 the first Old Girls dinner was held in the School Hall (then in Bird Street) on a Thursday evening. The tradition of a dinner has continued each year and it was so special to have this dinner return to the beautiful Stevenson Hall bedecked beautifully in purple and green.

It was said at that dinner in 1910: "This dinner is a step in the right direction; it helps bring the Originals (i.e. the first pupils from 1874), Old Girls and present girls in closer touch with one another, and binds us together in the common cause of working for the success of the Collegiate." And that is what is so special about Collegiate – the sisterhood lasts throughout your lifetime.

Seventy years ago, in 1953, the then Headmistress Mrs Brock wrote about the prospect of a move to this site in Parsons Hill: "There is one hardy annual – almost. Perennial now, - on which I must report, and that is the prospect of the move to the new school site – and the progress I have to report is exactly nil! We have been told by the Provincial Authorities that we may if we wish go ahead with the fencing of the new site – that they may be able to give us some idea of where the buildings are to go, but they cannot guarantee to abide by these plans – that we may engage an architect if we wish, but they cannot undertake to employ him when the time comes for building, or to carry on even with their own plans, let alone his. In view of all this uncertainty, and in full

agreement with the Junior Collegiate School, the Committee have decided to leave all plans for the new site in abeyance." Has anything changed, I ask? It took ten years before the next Headmistress could report: "I think the keyword for the Collegiate High School for Girls for 1963 has been 'co-operation'. As we come to the end of 1963 and enter the New Year, we discover that new buildings for the school will be commenced. These buildings will include those amenities which the Collegiate High School uses as part of its daily equipment, but which are not provided by the authorities.

"It is through the co-operation of all friends and interested bodies, parents and the old Collegiate girls over the last twenty years that the school committee is able to finance these extra facilities, and it is looking for co-operation in 1964 for further funds that must be raised in order to cover all commitments."

Sixty years later, on the doorstep of 2024, our 150th year, we still rely on the co-operation of friends, interested bodies, parents and Old Collegiate girls to finance our school. I ask that you consider becoming a part of the R150 for 150 years project and in this way make your own contribution to take Collegiate to greater heights for all future learners.

Sixty years ago, the Class of 1963 had very limited extra-mural activities: Tennis, swimming, hockey, netball, athletics, chess, debating, choir, SCA, the Three Arts Club (Art, Music and Literature) and the Recorder Club! (The leader of the Recorder Club wrote: "In all probability, many of our players fell by the wayside because they were not prepared to practise" – it seems that all fell by the wayside as the Recorder Club no longer exists!) Last week, we took almost 70 learners to Eunice High School in Bloemfontein for four days to participate in the Annual National All Girls' Schools Sports and







Cultural Festival: we played Hockey, Netball, Tennis, placed 3rd in Squash, ran in Cross Country, faced opponents across the chess boards, debated, delivered speeches, received creativity and innovation awards in Art, 2nd and 3rd place for creative writing, 2nd place in Master Chef and received a silver award for the best supporting actress in our dramatic performance. Most of all, though, our girls had fun, supported one another, developed their sisterhood, and displayed good manners to all at the festival. We are a busy school today and offer so many opportunities to the girls.

Fifty years ago, in 1973, Headmistress Jenkins wrote that with the rapid passage of time their thoughts moved on to the Centenary of our school, which they would celebrate in April the following year and that they were hard at work planning the celebrations. We are now doing the same for the 150 years celebrations next year and will only rest at the end of 2024! In 1973, the school staged Shakespeare's play, "Much Ado about Nothing". Forty-four girls were involved and Miss Ellis (then a teacher and not Headmistress) and Mr and Mrs Biggs 'sweated long and hard to perfect the props for the performance'. Janet Ellis and Bridget Heugh played the comic roles and Linda Marais and Cheryl Loock played the romantic lovers.

1983 brought Miss Ellis back to Collegiate as Headmistress. In her letter at the end of the year she wrote: "A school is not merely the buildings where we gather for lessons each day, nor is it just the body of people who teach or learn within the buildings. It is rather an intangible set of ideals and traditions with which we come into contact, within the framework of those buildings and people, by which we are enriched and to which we each in turn contribute something for those who are to follow." These words are as true today as they were then.

Some memories from 1983 include Cathy Belling and Mandy Carter winning first and second places as the South African entrants for the "International Scenario Writing Project for the 5th World Conference for Gifted Children, Youth and Adults." Founders' Day was celebrated on 26 August that year and Mrs Celia Robertson gave a most interesting and thought-provoking talk on "Women in a Man's World". I wonder when it will be "Men in a Women's World" or even simply, "People in the world". That year Collegiate staged with Grey

"The Lisbon Story" and a Roman Dinner was held for the Latin girls: entertainment included a short play, recitations, a Latin sing-song and Latin background music. However, perhaps the most interesting and momentous event was that after many years the matric girls were once again permitted to hold a dance in the Stevenson Hall. The Head Girl, Rosanne McWilliams reported: "The girls were thrilled and it proved to be a most successful evening enjoyed by all."

In 1993, there was a fair amount of uncertainty as to changes which may or may not come about, both within the country in general and in education in particular and Miss Ellis stated that no school individually could provide a solution to the crisis then in education and that they were deluding themselves if they thought that the education they had known in the past would continue in the future. She said that classes would inevitably increase in size but that that in itself need not lead to a lowering of standards – instead teachers would have to become more adaptable in dealing with the larger classes but greater self-discipline and active involvement would be required from pupils, who would have to take greater responsibility for their acquisition of knowledge. I am pleased to report that classes are still roughly the same size at Collegiate as in 1993 and this is due to the astute management by the School Governing Body of finances largely from school fees that parents pay so diligently and sometimes with great sacrifice. In the years to come, the financing of the school will need to be assisted more by sources beyond the parents if we are to continue to offer what we do.

Twenty years ago, in 2003 Head Girl Nina Holderness wrote: "To the Girls of the College, One day we will sit down, think back to our days in these floral blue parachutes and sticky hot blazers and long for – most definitely not these clothes – but for friendships, good times and laughs that this school has brought us!" There were certainly laughs (and horror) when the Water Polo team travelled to Cape Town for a tournament at Westerford High School and the highlight of the tour was that the school bus with everything they had taken on tour was stolen!

Mrs Kelly – Cari Maclean back in 2003 – was the Rowing Captain and at SA Champs that year she led four crews in the A-final and a crew who won the B-final! We no longer have rowing at Collegiate, but we do have Mrs Kelly!



In those days, the summer dresses were pleated and were regarded as floral blue parachutes to be worn with sticky hot blazers. At least the current girls are spared the pleats and dresses blowing up over one's head in the Ggeberha wind!

2013 was the year that history was made when Mr Derryk Jordan was appointed Deputy Principal – the first male Deputy Principal in the History of Collegiate. Mr Jordan has now moved on to Clarendon Park Primary and is doing wonderful things for the school. We enjoy welcoming Clarries girls to Collegiate in Grade Eight!

So, what has happened in the last ten years that you would find different from your memories of Collegiate?

- The School turned 140 in 2014 and hosted an All Girls' Schools Sport and Cultural Festival for the third year.
- The staff room was enlarged and the front office was remodelled to be more inviting.
- The library was revamped and modernised due to the financial generosity of Mrs Gill Gray, nèe De Wet, and the time and hard work of Sarah Bisdée (nèe Wilson).
- The original art room, which had become the old cafeteria/ lvy Leaf and then converted to class rooms, is now a large Drama Room complete with theatre lights.
- The cottage between the pools has been converted into the Games Club.
- The College Girl shop has closed and the uniform outsourced to Birch's. The College Girl venue is now a muchneeded Board Room

- The Blue Area flooring has been replaced and the area is now lighter with an air of spaciousness. It is now the Old Blue Area!
- Canvasses of five courageous women are hanging in the Old Blue Area. These promote our five values: good work ethic, respect, responsibility, compassion and integrity.
- Lizo Pemba's striking painting, "Xhosa Wedding", commissioned in 2017, hangs in the same area.
- A selection of the girls' art pieces each year are printed, framed and then hung around the school.
- Girls' artworks now grace the Queen stairs and it is an honour for a girl to have her art work hanging there.
- The Transformation Task Team, mandated for a year at the end of 2016, resulted in the "Comfortable in our Skins" policy.
- There is now a permanent Diversity, Inclusivity and Transformation Committee of the SGB.
- The Simamele Forum has been introduced where learners discuss relevant but difficult topics in a structured way.
 This brings greater understanding of and unity amongst our learners.
- We have introduced a successful Educator-Internship position for a post-graduate student in financial need and from a previously disadvantaged group.
- We partner with the Guardian Company on Safeguarding
- We have a Wellness Department with two counsellors, one



with a social work background, and a clinical psychologist, overseen by a Deputy Principal.

- The Hostel Dining room boasts a magnificent servery and the garden has been re-landscaped and a braai pit added.
- The campus has borehole water.
- We have a cricket pitch (not the real Mc Coy), a successful Cricket Team and this year added much needed cricket nets to our campus.
- The Astro Turf, originally constructed in 2008, has been resurfaced and upgraded to an international standard water-based Astro Turf (borehole water) and a mini-astro installed.
- SuperSport Schools has installed cameras at the Netball courts and Hockey turf for live-streaming on DSTV.
- A workshop and storeroom have been added behind the squash courts, a much-needed addition for the maintenance and running of our campus.
- The downstairs bathroom next to the previous College Girl shop has been gutted and modernised – now the girls need to fundraise to do the same to the upstairs bathrooms.
- We have been revamping the gardens now that we have borehole water to revive life in this time of drought.

The biggest change over the past decade has been the development and implementation of a digital technology strategy. There is Wi-Fi throughout the school and the hostel. Every teaching venue has a data projector and an Apple TV. Every girl has a device which in Grades 8, 9 and 10 must be an iPad or MacBook. We are a Microsoft Teams school and use the MS Teams platform. This is the prime means of communication with the girls. In this area, Collegiate has been at the forefront in Ggeberha and we remain at the forefront of the city, district and even province in our core business – academic achievement. Each year we achieve a 100% pass rate with Bachelor passes between 95 and 100%. Our girls go on to achieve at university and in their careers, and we are proud that Collegiate is the launch pad for this. Looking back in the annals of the school, I noted that a Matric of 1898 went on to become an esteemed University of Cape Town scientist and specialist in plant taxonomy – this at a time when it was rare for females to do so. The example was set for our girls many years ago.

In conclusion, 1991, now thirty-two years ago, is, I believe, the **second founding** of Collegiate. It is the year that Collegiate's Management team and the School Committee grasped the opportunity to adopt a non-racial admission's policy and to open the doors to all children of South Africa, to act with **integrity**, one of our core values, and to start the new journey to becoming a united school of all races where all are comfortable in their skins. Journeys never really end — we just progress further down the road. Sometimes we hit potholes — large ones in our beautiful land — and the scenery might change, but the values that drive the sisterhood of strong, confident girls, united in our diversity, remain.











Founders' Day Address – Dr Ela Manga

What a great joy and privilege it is to be standing here before you today. I remember, like it was yesterday, 32 years ago on a warm windy January morning sitting here in this very hall, a hopeful but anxious 16-year-old in my new over-sized summer uniform, at my very first assembly at a new school, that for the first time, that year, had opened to people of all races.

1991 was a tumultuous time in our country's history, heaving with fear and pain but pulsating with possibility. Being one of only two people of colour in Grade Eleven, what was then Standard Nine, my presence was initially met with a cautious and respectful curiosity. But very soon, all the labels and divisions faded as I found a friendship circle and a shared sisterhood which became an important anchor in the stormy emotional seas of a young life and through the anxiety of an uncertain future.

And now returning after all these years and many life experiences, I am filled with so many emotions. I feel nostalgia, as if I was singing 'Girls of the College' just yesterday. Walking through the corridors and addressing you in the very hall that has held the dreams and visions of thousands of young women for over a century I also feel a part of something much bigger than myself, a connection to an iconic institution, but *more* importantly to a culture that is **bravely** evolving to meet an emerging future.

I feel a sense of overwhelming hope. In a world where so many systems and institutions are collapsing and clinging onto old paradigms and outdated ways of thinking, here I see an institution that is cutting edge in its approach, deeply rooted in values, open to diverse worldviews and that is providing a solid foundation for the change makers, creatives, entrepreneurs, and the future leaders of our country.

But mostly, I feel a sense of *belonging*. Standing here today, I appreciate more than ever, the belonging and acceptance that I have always experienced at Collegiate, a feeling of safety that allowed me to access my strengths and feel supported in my weaknesses and vulnerabilities. A belonging that instilled a sense of confidence to carve my own path in this world.

But what does it mean to belong?

Maya Angelou said that "true belonging is a spiritual practice, the ability to find sacredness in being part of something but also the courage to stand alone".

And this is my first offering to you today.

Many times in our lives we feel like we need to give up or hide an aspect of ourselves in order to belong, but belonging is not just about fitting in or conforming. It is about being accepted for who you are, for your unique strengths and qualities. It is about being able to express yourself freely, to share your opinions, to feel heard and respected.

Belonging also offers us the experience of feeling safe, which



I have come to realise is the primary condition required to heal and build resilience, that gives us the courage to express our passion and to follow the impulses of our heart.

About two years into my medical career, I realised that I no longer wanted to practise medicine in a conventional way. I gave up my GP practice to discover a different way of practising medicine - a way that felt more sustainable and empowering for my patients.

I did not find a sense of belonging with my fellow doctors, many of whom thought I was wayward and weird. In those years many times I didn't feel I belonged anywhere. The world felt like a dark and confusing place. I felt so alone in my vision for healthcare. I didn't realise it at the time, but what brought me courage wasn't a physical place of belonging, but a deeper belonging to the values that had been instilled in me very early on in my life.

Often in the pursuit of success and fulfilment of our dreams, and especially when we walk the road less travelled, we can often feel disconnected from a sense of belonging.

When we work hard and hold so many responsibilities, it's easy to move very far away from our original vision, our sources of energy and what really matters. We get caught up in the details of the doing and forget the big picture. It is in these moments, when we feel disillusioned and despairing that it is even *more* important to remember to return to the places and people that offered us a felt sense of belonging, to remember what matters most, to see with fresh eyes, to recalibrate so that we can follow the impulse of our heart and the path of joy again.

And so, my second offering to you today is to follow your joy always.

When I was sixteen years old, even though I was interested in medicine, the first impulse of my heart was to study journalism. I have always had a passion for writing and stories and in fact, it was here at Collegiate that my love for writing was recognised and nurtured. With the encouragement of Mrs Paterson, we started the Creative Writing society, which I believe still exists today! Anyway, this journalism idea, to say the least, was strongly discouraged by the doctors in my family who didn't believe that this was a stable career choice.

So, the door to journalism closed, and despite the fact that I didn't get 6 A's, the door to medical school opened. After many years of very hard work and sleepless nights I made it through and found myself living the life that ticked all the boxes. A busy medical practice, a great husband, a lovely townhouse in a cool part of Johannesburg, it all looked wonderful on the outside. But inside, all was not well. I was burnt out, my career lacked meaning. I was restless, confused, and lonely. Medicine, or rather the kind of medicine in which I was trained, was no longer bringing me the joy and fulfilment I thought it would. I knew there was more. After much soul searching and a constant process of trusting my gut and following my joy, my path slowly began to unfold.

I ended up finding my passion in working with people differently, that empowered them with the knowledge and skill to support their health and wellbeing by tapping into their own inner resources and wisdom. I carved a career path that didn't exist, a multidimensional medicine that integrates neuroscience, principles of nature, art, and a function we take for granted, conscious breathing. This led to me founding Breathwork Africa, an organisation that trains breathwork practitioners globally.

Throughout my journey, my love for stories of the human spirit chased me. It sat on my shoulder as I listened to my patients reveal the layers of emotion and stressors hidden beneath their symptoms. These stories opened up a deeper understanding of myself, of life and having more compassion for others which then led me right back to my passion for writing. Life finally brought me back to my joy for writing but this time it was enriched by a deeper and wider understanding of life through my own experiences, challenges and being the witness to many stories of healing. This all led to me writing and publishing a book based on the healing journeys of my patients.

Following the impulse of the heart and the path of joy is often not easy or predictable. It means trusting with full faith the doors that open and those that close. Often it feels more difficult than choosing the path we know.

But what I have come to realise, is that there is always a bigger picture. The path is never straight, and it reveals itself as we walk it. It is only in retrospect that we can appreciate that there are no mistakes and failures and that every life experience, especially the tough ones, are necessary and relevant.

So, no matter if you are 15 and melancholic or 50 and menopausal, if we follow our gut, chase the feeling of wonder that comes with the unknown, our path will unfold exactly how it should to support our growth.

So, remember as tough at it may feel at times and no matter what happens next, always stay on the path of your joy.

I could never have imagined, 32 years ago, that following the impulse of my heart, and pursuing my passion for words would eventually lead back to this hall, this school, and to all of you.

Our school motto, 'Facta non Verba' means 'Deeds not Words'. This motto has served me well. However, along the course of my life I have also come to realise that it's both deeds and the words that matter.

The words that we speak to ourselves matter. They can either support us or stand in the way of us trusting our gut.

The words we say to each other matter, they can provide a powerful place of belonging and safety for others so that they too can trust their hearts.

In a world of Al and ChatGPT, our own authentic words matter, because they come from your unique essence.

Words are a force that can transform anxiety into creative action.

Rooted in belonging, may your words and deeds always express an authentic, courageous power, the wonder of the unknown and a joyful curiosity that will craft a path that is an expression of your unique gift to the world.


